Report

Serbia was dominant team in the game but it needed three periods to build a safe gap and win the game. Report

The Aussies didn't have too much time to recover from their bad, six-goal defeat against Greece: that match ended at 21.00hrs on Sunday and the following day saw them lining up for the swim-off at 10.20hrs. However, they started the week as if nothing had happened 13 hours earlier – at least for three periods they were really dominating China. This time their defence worked well, the Chinese also helped them a bit by committing a lot of unforced errors in front.

After a close opening period, the girls from Down Under killed a Chinese man-up then scored twice in succession to jump to a 2-5 lead. From that point it was a chasing game but the Asians couldn't come closer than two goals, and whenever they managed to score, the reply came immediately from the next possession. In 7 seconds after 4-6, in 26 after 5-7. What's more, with 0:00.5 remaining on the clock, the Aussies went 5-9 up, Danielle Morrissey's 10m shot found its way to the net (it was her 4th hit in the morning).

What seemed a fine psychological boost at first glance turned out to be a way too effective cooler – the Aussies slowed down their play in the fourth (perhaps having two matches in 13 hours also took its toll) which didn't look too dangerous for a while. For three and a half minutes the game just rolled, then China scored from a man-up. Another one and a half minutes gone, they earned a penalty and converted it, 7-9, 3:01 to go. The Aussies missed the first match ball, a 6 on 5, Deng Zewen netted her fourth for 8-9, and still 2:09 remained on the clock. But the comeback ended here, no real chances were created, while Australia's comeback after their bad defeat proved to be successful at the end.

Report

To be honest, the opening minutes will not be remembered as celebrations of the goalkeepers' skills: seven goals were scored in 4:24 minutes and both netminders struggled to stop even the easier shots. Report

Report

Unlike at senior level, the two sides here were not in the same weight category. By all means. The Dutch had much stronger players – they are the reigning European champions in this age-group – which was mirrored in every part of the game and of the field. Their powerful shots destroyed the Hungarian defense in two periods, though the Magyars broke under the pressure much earlier than expected. The Dutch were on target seven times on their first eight shots which led to the change of the Hungarian goalie – but that only slowed down the process for a while.

Bente Rogge and Brigit Mulder led the charge of the ‘Oranje’ and the margin grew period by period. The Hungarians switched to a much tighter defence for the second half which resulted four less goals in the back but marking stronger rivals also burnt too much energy and they could score only once which led to a heavy, 10-goal defeat.

With this win, the Dutch girls already booked their place in the quarters as winner of Group A and also earned an off day, a rather valuable asset in a seven-day tournament.

Report

The Russians learnt a lot from Hungary's opening day's struggle and were well prepared for the Japanese's special defensive approach. They did what was the best against them: moving a lot and also trying to beat them one-on-one occasionally. Since their bodyshape is more robust, sometimes it was an easy task. In the meantime, the Japanese also played an open attacking game, turning the encounter into a scoring festival.

The Russians didn't leave anything for chance, began strongly and quickly earned a 1-3 lead. Later, deep into the second they were already five up at 2-7. Maria Bezsneva had some pretty nice goals, just like Bella Khamzaeva, both netted four in this match.

For the last period the Japanese were running out of gas and this resulted an extra flood of goals from the Russians who managed to set a single-period scoring record so far by netting eight in the closing eight minutes. Some of them were really spectacular but the very last one pleased the crowd the most as it came after a late Japan goal when only four seconds remained from the match. After the restart, Khamzaeva let the ball fly from her half and it surprised the goalie so the 14m shot marked the 20th goal for the Russians who earned their first win here.

Report

The level of the Greeks' focus wasn't quite the same compared to the previous evening when they had produced an outstanding game against Australia. While they had managed to hold the Aussies on four goals for three and a half periods, the South Africans scored those four goals in little more than nine minutes. The

first lapse in the hosts' concentration came after 3-0 when their low-ranked opponents climbed back to 4-3 and they were still in 'visible' distance at the beginning of the second period at 7-4.

There another match began as the Greeks raised their game at both ends: the remaining part went to them with 14-1 (note their 9 for 9 in extraman – it's a feat in any game). Though it wasn't a contest, the home crowd enjoyed the show and cheered loudly after each goal as some of them were spectacular.

This win keeps the Greeks on the top of Group B and only a 4+ goals defeat against China can remove them from there.

The second day's morning session already saw two outstanding matches. First, Australia overcame China and its disappointment after the previous evening's bad defeat against Greece. What seemed to be an easy game after three periods when the Aussies were 9-5 up, turned into a nailbiter as China came back to 9-8 and had two minutes to equalise but couldn't score any more.

Italy held the Canadians on two goals in the last three periods, so after the first period's scoring festival the Italians earned a fine 8-5 win. That sent them directly to the quarter-finals as they already booked the top spot in Group C.

In the other two matches Serbia beat Slovakia 11-8 to secure its berth in the crossover matches, while the USA downed New Zealand 11-4 and faces a last and crucial group clash against Spain.

The afternoon session began with a big-margin win for Spain, over Croatia (18-2) and it continued the same way despite the second game featured the Netherlands and Hungary. However, what's usually a great match-up in women's tourneys, sometimes can be different in age-group level. Currently the Dutch field a much better team than the Magyars and they didn't give any chance for their rivals as they won quite comfortably (14-4). This was also enough to earn the first place in Group A and a berth in the quarters.

During sunset Japan also went down against the Russians in a spectacular high-scoring contest where the Russians set a single-period scoring record by netting 8 in the closing quarter, including a last-second 14m blast which marked their 20th hit in the afternoon. The last match of the day brought a similar scenario, Greece routed the South Africans 21-5 and also heads to the best eight, though they have some task against China in the last round of the prelims.
